

Horses and Bushfires

Planning Template

Not everyone thinks clearly in an emergency.

A written and well practiced plan will help you remember what needs to be done during a crisis. Although you may not live in a high risk area, you may agist your horse in an area of high bushfire risk.

Whether your horses are located at home or on an agistment property, you must plan and prepare for their safety.

There are steps that you can take to reduce the impact of bushfire on your horses.



Planning for bushfire

You and your family should already have a personal bushfire survival plan and it's important to remember that your own safety is paramount. In order to make well thought out decisions, you need to consider and plan for your horses whether or not you have them at home or agisted elsewhere.

Your plan may include:

- Preparing your property
- Preparing your horse
- What to do on hot, dry and windy days
- After the fire

PREPARING YOURSELF AND YOUR PROPERTY		
YOUR ACTIONS	WHO WILL DO THIS?	DONE
Download the VicEmergency App to your smart phone		
Understand the Fire Danger Ratings and identify your trigger to act		

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE	WHO WILL DO THIS?	DONE
Reduce vegetation around fencing (manually or spraying)		
Maintain a safe area for your horse ie. grazed paddock or sand arena		
Open internal gates where possible (do not allow access to the road) on hot, dry and windy days		

You may choose to leave your horse on the current property or relocate to a safer location. A number of considerations should be taken into account when making this decision.

Late evacuation or moving of horses can be very dangerous. Horses are flight animals and may not want to be caught or loaded onto floats if they sense danger. There will also be a lot of traffic on the road (including fire trucks) and visibility could be limited due to smoke.

PRE PARING YOUR HORSE		
ACTIONS	WHO WILL DO THIS?	DONE
Microchip your horse and ensure details are current		
Develop an emergency kit forRelocation of horse; andFirst-aid treatment		
Remove halters, rugs and fly veils to reduce chance of burns		

AFTER THE FIRE		
ACTIONS	WHO WILL DO THIS?	DONE
If possible, get horses off the burnt ground (heat in ground can cause burns and laminitis)		
Check any damage to fencing (keep in mind that power outages may affect electric fencing)		
Check water supply (power outages may also affect automatic feeders)		

Agistment Properties, Trail Ride Centres and Riding Schools

With running an equestrian business, brings the added complexity of people visiting your property, sometimes very ad hoc, and also the expectations of ensuring the safety of horses in your care. a bushfire survival plan incorporated into your business plan to reduce the risk to clients and staff (if applicable). Depending on your level of bushfire risk and number of clients the details in this will vary, however here are some points to consider for your property.

If you operate such a business you should have
