### Tagged PDF's



Bushfire information is now available online as a tagged PDF allowing those who are blind or have low vision to access all the essential information thanks to the assistance of a screen reader and other assistive technology.

A screen reader reads out loud all the text on the screen, enabling our reader to access valuable fire safety information at home. To other readers the document looks the same.

Did you know that CFA provides closed captions with their video's? Don't forget to turn the captions on.


### Easy English (#



10 Summer bushfire topics have been translated into Easy English. These resources make information accessible to everyone, especially people who have a disability or where English is a additional language. Ideally, a support person assists the reader to read, understand and make decisions about the information.

Easy English is a writing style that helps people who find it hard to read and understand English. It has a lower reading level than 'Simple English', using short sentences with an image.

CFA works with other organisations to develop specialised resources for people with intellectual disabilities or who have autism to understand fire. Social story books are available for Bushfire and Grassfire. Contact community.programs@cfa.vic. gov.au to access.

## Auslan 69

CFA now has videos with an Auslan interpreter accessible via the website. A series of Bushfire preparedness videos can be accessed via the CFA Website or the Deaf emergency information website.

Auslan (Australian sign language) is the language of the Australian Deaf community, and is often the first language of this community and recognised as a language in its own right. Auslan has its own grammar and vocabulary, manual communication and gestures are used instead of sound to express the speaker's thoughts and meaning.

- Interpreter 131 450: If you do not speak English, call the Translating and Interpreting Service.

Escape. Each of these modules provides advice for carers and enables a bushfire plan to be developed together with the person they care for. Bushfire Plan Templates are available in large print and consider the special needs of the person involved.

Person-Centred Emergency Preparedness (PCEP) is a process that enables people with a disability to make emergency preparedness plans that are tailored to their individual support needs.
