Emergency kit means the things your pets need if you leave home.




You should pack the kit before summer starts.

A pet first aid kit can include things like bandages.





You should also pack contact details for your vet.

You should put your phone number on your






pet carriers.

Microchip means the vet puts a tiny device under the pet's skin.



If the pet gets lost the microchip has information about the pet.



If you leave your pets at home you should tell a neighbour.



You can plan with the neighbour about what to do if there is a bushfire.
