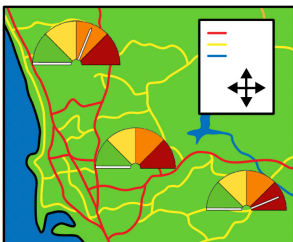


Fire danger ratings

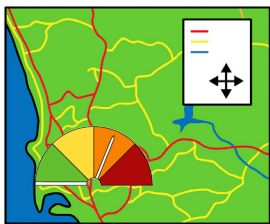

We can help you know what to do for each fire danger rating.

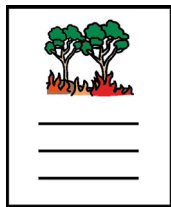

It is a good idea to have a **bushfire plan**.

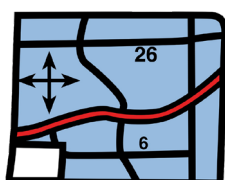
A bushfire plan tells you

- what to do if there is a bushfire near you



- where you can go

For example, stay with a friend in a place away from bushfires.



- how you will leave

For example, the road you will take



- what you will bring.

For example, clothes



A bushfire plan might also tell you what you will do if

- there is a fire in your area

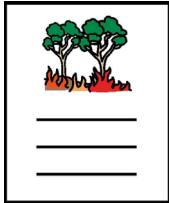
and



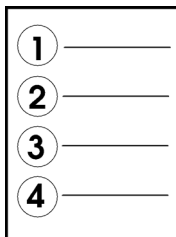
- you **cannot** leave.



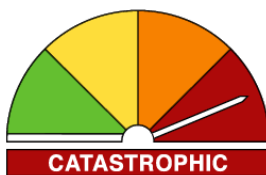
You can ask someone you trust to help you write a bushfire plan.



You should have a bushfire plan for every fire danger rating.



There are 4 fire danger ratings.



1. Catastrophic

Catastrophic is the red part of the fire danger rating.



Catastrophic fire danger rating

- is the most dangerous fire rating

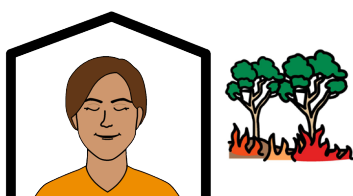


- means that if a fire starts people will likely die.



If you know your area will have a catastrophic fire danger rating you should

- **not** be in the area



- go to a **safe place** as soon as you can.

A safe place when there is fire danger means somewhere there is not likely to be a bushfire.



For example, a safe place might be

- a shopping centre

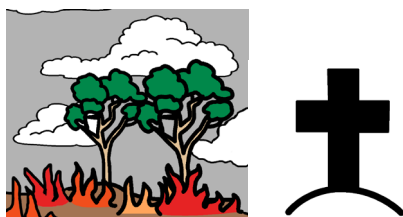


- a library.



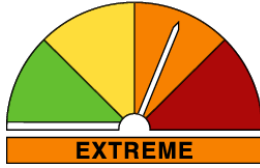
If you do **not** go to a safe place

- you might **not** be able to get away from the fire



- you might die.

2. Extreme

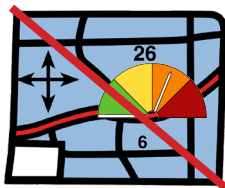


Extreme is the orange part of the fire danger rating.



Extreme fire danger rating means

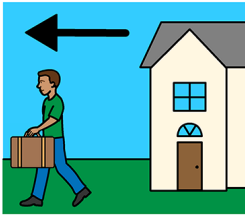
- if there is a fire it will be very dangerous
- the weather will be hot and dry
- the weather will also be windy.



If the fire danger rating is extreme you should

- **not** travel through the area
- leave as soon as you can.

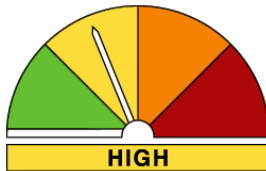




If a fire starts when the fire danger rating is extreme you should go to a safe place.

You should go to a safe place before the fire comes near your house.

3. High



High fire danger rating is the yellow part of the fire danger rating.



If the fire danger rating is high you should decide what you will do if a fire starts.

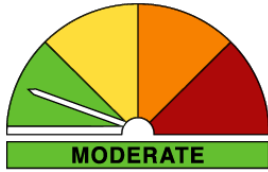


If a fire starts when the fire danger rating is high

- you will be in danger
- you should go to a safe place as soon as you can.



4. Moderate

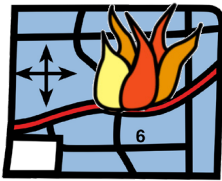


Moderate fire danger rating is the green part of the fire danger rating.



If the fire danger rating is moderate

- firefighters can put out most fires
- you should find out where a fire is if it starts.



If the fire danger rating is moderate you should still make sure your house is safe for a fire.

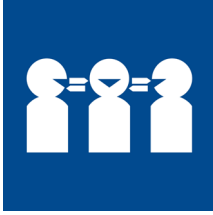

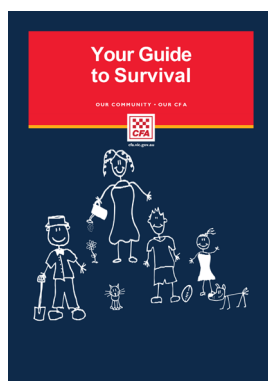
